Give us the ability to adapt to the cultural, economic and social changes that occur in the neighborhoods we serve.


Receive our prayer, O God.



OLIVET EVANGELICAL LUTHERAN CHURCH OF SYLVANIA, OHIO January 29, 2023

The meeting was called to order at 10:34 a.m. by President Penny Moran. A quorum was established, with 117 voting members present. Pastor Nate opened the meeting with prayer.

Minutes of the 2022 Annual Meeting were approved as written.

Financial Secretary's Report – Mike Vince:

Mike's totals include monies collected for the operation of the church and exclude any donations to special funds. Total 2022 giving was \$711,160.98, down from \$718,702.88 last year. The Financial Secretary's Report was approved as presented.

Treasurer's Report – Barry Shaner:

Although our giving was off for the year, our expenses were also much lower than projected. We ended the year with a \$17,000 deficit; \$20,000 was moved from reserves to cover this difference. The remaining balance in our reserves is \$126,401.70.

We are well on our way to retiring the CLC mortgage debt within the next three to four years. The current balance is \$277,388.00. The Treasurer's report was approved as presented.

Proposed 2023 Budget - Justin Black, Finance Team:

The proposed budget for 2023 is \$758,000.00. Justin explained that 60% of the cost of running a church is employee cost. The proposed budget reflects a 3% raise for salaried staff and a 5% raise for hourly staff. The other area of increase is utility costs.

The proposed budget is 7% more than the actual giving for 2022. Justin presented a slide showing giving vs. needs for the past five years.

TP Collection – Carol Cook:

Collection of toilet paper for Redeemer's food pantry guests has been an ongoing project this year. Carol thanked the congregation on behalf of the Food Insecurity team for far exceeding the goal of 2200 rolls. Actual number of rolls collected was 5,567! This project will continue in 2023.

Voting Results:

The counters reported that there were 111 ballots collected.

All nominees were approved unanimously.

The 2023 Budget was approved with 104 "yes" votes and 7 "no" votes.

The meeting was adjourned at 11:27 a.m. by President Penny Moran.

Our ministry activities go well beyond this limited list.

The <u>momentum</u> that is caused by these ministries will continue, because we are governed by our Vision and Mission and blessed by the Spirit. I have often said, "I don't run the place. I'm just the pastor here." Indeed, that has been the case, not because I have been neglectful, but because I deeply believe that given the freedom

and love and resources to explore and discern, any given group of people can faithfully do amazing things in <u>Jesus' name</u>. My departure, which we will all feel to varying degrees and in various ways, does not need to interrupt these ministry priorities and efforts.

May God grant us all the love, justice, and mercy to be bearers of light, and may we always be mindful that there is nothing in all creation that can separate us from the love of God in Christ Jesus our Lord.

2023 saw an increase of the numbers of people in need and who took advantage of our Food Distribution Ministries: Daily Bread and Olivet Food Pantry. We had hoped to open Daily Bread to inside dining, however we were unable to find enough volunteers to support inside dining. The yearly Rummage Sale was canceled due to not having a leader available to manage it. We will have the sale in 2024 with a willing volunteer to lead. Bible study opportunities have been expanded. Our music and Vacation Bible School programs remain excellent.

Olivet has accomplished several historic firsts this past year. Chris Adams, a youth member on our Church Council, proposed the installation of a bike rack outside the Christian Life Center. With approval from Council, Chris raised the money and installed the bike rack, earning his Eagle Scout rank. In December 2023, Olivet was given \$216,000 to pay the remainder of our mortgage for the Christian Life Center. This amazing gift was given by Harold and Carol Leupp in the hope that others would step up to support Olivet's programs and goals.

We have experienced several roof leaks and multiple water leaks which requires increased maintenance in the older parts of our church. These issues are still being resolved.

Please read the yearly report and take notice of all the hard-working volunteers that have contributed to a successful year of achievement. We sponsored a family from Ukraine with many donations in money, furniture and housing.

Lastly, I wish to thank the members of the Church Council, our pastors, and our many volunteers for making 2023 a remarkable year. I have had an amazing experience in 2023. I volunteered to serve as President for one year due to no one available to serve. I want to give a special thanks to Ed Rupley who is willing to run for President in 2024. Youth & Family Ministry Team - Becky Cress

High school senior and Boy Scout, Chris Adams, reached Eagle Scout this year. His final project was to install a bike rack outside of the CLC doors. To raise funds he held a spaghetti dinner in mid-February.

The Easter Egg-stravaganza was held April 11 with modest attendance.

Two youth assisted with quilt-tying at the end of April. Three more youth helped to pack and load quilts in preparation for donation in September.

Several families, high schoolers, and young adults from Olivet participated in the Northwest Ohio Synod's event, **Stories & S'mores**, at the treehouse village in Oak Openings in May.

Vacation Bible School, Operation Restoration: Mending God's World, was held from June 19-23 with more than 80 children attending. High school and Body Shop youth volunteered as small group leaders, station helpers, and on the skit team. Many thanks to all the adults and youth who made this ministry possible!

An excellent discussion for parents and adults about developing mental health in preteens and teens was led by Linda Lewin in August.

Rally Sunday was held September 10. All ages were welcome to reconnect, play yard games, and enjoy doughnuts and cider in the courtyard.

The **Advent Festival** was open to people of all ages. Congregants received Advent devotionals and calendars, participated in activities, and crafted Advent items.

Olivet's **Family Christmas Eve Service**, held an impromptu Christmas pageant in celebration of Jesus' birth Sunday, December 24 at 10 a.m. Nearly 100 people attended.

Tender Hearts Social Circle - Mike Linehan. Regular get-togethers were held at Te'kela.

Pastor Nate led a Lenten Bible study Tuesday mornings, and an Advent Bible Study Dec. 4, 11, 18.

A kids' book club, led by Donna Mens, meets Thursday afternoons in the Teen Room.

Three junior and senior high school youth joined the **Olivet Choir** this fall. Addyson Darm, and Bradley and Blake Lehman attended rehearsals, sang on Sundays, and performed in the Christmas cantata.

Safety Team - Shannon Walker, team leader. Two CPR classes were held in late February.

Equity Team, Mike Linehan, team leader. A small team continues to update the **artwork** around the church building to better represent and welcome those in our community. This year the team focused on the church office and entryway, purchasing several pieces depicting the transfiguration, Jesus' baptism, and more. The equity team is also examining our media presence and creating a feedback loop.

In the beginning of the year, a team of adults began meeting to think about ways to address growing societal isolation and how LGBTQIA+ teens are more likely to struggle with mental health. The resulting ministry, **Q** & **A** (Queer & Allies), is a group of youth aged 12-18 yrs who meet monthly for a meal, to learn about a variety of spiritual practices, and for fellowship.

A small equity library for adults can be found in the atrium. New books are added periodically. Children's books with themes about equity are being circulated in the sanctuary and CLC bookshelves.

A Christian Nationalism seminar, held in the month of October, was well attended.

Women's Monday Morning Bible Study - We have had a wonderful year in Women's Bible Study reading the book of Matthew and using videos from the Bible Project and other resources to deepen our understanding. We took a break from our reading of Matthew during the summer and met monthly in the home of Penny Moran (thanks, Penny!) using a study from Anna Madsen in Gather Magazine called "Salvation Now." In December, we had a visit from Jesus' mother, Mary (thank you, Katie Macaro) who told us about her life and her time with Jesus. It was a special day! We will continue our study of Matthew into 2024. All women of the congregation (and their sisters and friends) are invited to be part

Youth finished their study of Lutheran History and the Catechism in the spring and began the Old Testament with the start of the new school year using the curriculum *Collaborate* through Sparkhouse.

Winter Retreat at YMCA Storer Camps: Body Shop's first sleep-away retreat since the pandemic took place in February. Youth had lessons, played games, took a night hike, and roasted marshmallows.

Two scrapbooking fundraisers, organized by Karen Keefer, were held on Saturday, April 15 and Saturday, October 7 in support of the upcoming 2024 Winter Retreat at YMCA Storer Camps. Body Shop students served food and helped to unload and load guest's vehicles, while parents donated food and themed baskets for a silent auction.

Linda Lewin led an session promoting preteen/early teen mental health with Body Shop students in April.

Acolyte trainings were held in the spring and fall.

Christmas Cookie Caper - On Sunday, December 10, kids decorated cookies, made Christmas cards and delivered Advent devotions to homebound members of the congregation.

Teacher Recognition was held Sunday, August 6, for Sunday School teachers and Body Shop mentors.

Six to nine high school youth and young adults gathered with leader(s), and the occasional Olivet guest, on January 22, March 12, April 23, and July 9.

Over 30 friends and members of Olivet, primarily youth and young adults, participated in an evening of both frivolity and **meaningful connection**. The Vozniuk family, newly arrived from Ukraine, joined the evening of fun!!

An outing to a **cosmic glow bowl** was held **November 4**. Five youth aged 12-16 attended, ate pizza and enjoyed each other's company.

Our annual Christmas Party was held on **December 16**. Many thanks to **Hunter Morrison** for assisting with this event!!

Created to Be, the July 2024 ELCA Youth & Young Adult Gatherings in New Orleans – Eight youth, ages 13-18, and three adult leaders are planning to attend. Two young adults are preparing to attend the first ever Young Adult Gathering, held parallel to the Youth Gathering in New Orleans.

Fundraisers:

A **scrapbooking event**, organized by Karen Keefer, was held on Saturday, January 14, 2024 to gather funds to cover registration, travel, boarding, and meals. High School youth served food and helped to unload and load guest's vehicles, while parents donated food and themed baskets for a silent auction.

A Shrove Tuesday Pancake Drive-thru Dinner was cooked and distributed by youth. Proceeds went to the Youth Gathering fund.

Milestones - Led by Pr. Nate, Pr. Melissa and Becky Cress

Baptism classes were held as needed, led by Jan Kirk.

- A Bible Workshop was held in May for kids third grade and up who had received an NRSV Bible.
- A First Communion Class led by Pastor Nate was held in May for kids wishing to receive communion.
- **High School graduation** was celebrated on Sunday, June 11. Graduates were recognized at each worship service and a reception was held in the courtyard between services.
- **Blessing of Backpacks & Electronics** for students returning to classes and working adults was held Sunday, August 20. All who brought something to be blessed received a special tag or sticker for their bag or device.
- **Bible Presentations**: Children were presented with Bibles on Rally Sunday Preschoolers received *The Family Time Bible*, Third Graders received a *Connect Bible NRSV*, and new Body Shop students received *Collaborate: Lutheran Student Bible NRSV*.
- **Confirmation**: Five youth were confirmed on Reformation Sunday, October 29. Four preparation sessions were held for students to create their banners and compose and rehearse their faith statements. A small **reception** was held afterward in the atrium for family, friends and congregants.

Ministries in Support of Our Congregation

- Scrapbooking/Crafting Day is typically a triannual event at Olivet and we were back to normal in 2023 with the event being held in January, April and October. Karen Keefer continues to lead and organize this effort which supplements specific youth activities such as the Youth Retreat held at Camp Storer each winter; substantially reducing the cost to students/parents. This is also the case with the ELCA National Youth Gathering held on a triannual basis, coming up in July 2024. The event is very popular with women attending to spend a day in our Christian Life Center doing their craft in addition to being served a fabulous breakfast, lunch and snacks. The three events did raise \$6166 in 2023. Our Scrapbooking event is known as the best in the area—all because of the fine effort of Karen. She is tireless in her attention to the food as well as obtaining and offering raffle prizes, a massages therapist, and opportunity to buy scrapbooking supplies from a dealer at the event. A huge thanks to Karen for the many, many years of doing this for the good of the youth of Olivet.
- College Student Outreach led by Michelle Lane. The College Student Support Ministry began in 2001 and is intended to support any undergraduate college student, home or away, who has their name submitted to the church office. Notices of this ministry are placed in our publications as well as postcards sent to any family with a known qualifying student. The college ministry support program sent Easter cards/gift cards to 15 students this past spring. In November, Olivet sent care packages to this year's students prior to finals.
- Communion Visitation: Twenty-four members of Olivet Lutheran Church who are unable to attend worship regularly due to infirmity, transportation or other needs received communion in their residences this year. In addition to a quarterly visit from Pastor Nate or Pastor Melissa, these congregational members ensure our beloved saints receive communion each month: Dave & JoAnn Bell, Shirley Brodbeck, Darla Culberson, Jennifer & Addy Darm, Nancy Hamilton, Rinda Holshoe, Bob & Donna Mens, Mike Moore, Penny Moran, Susan Santoro and Chrisann Shaner. Many thanks to Fred Sandmann who provided worship twice monthly at Kingston Residence of Sylvania for TEN years.
- **C.A.R.E. Group Connecting And Reaching (Olivet's) Elders:** We focus on those senior members who are on the prayer list, reside in assisted/nursing home, are homebound or live with a family caregiver. With Pastor Melissa's help, this wonderful group uses cards, calls, and prayers to keep those senior members connected with the congregation. We are so thankful to Ron Gabel who established a memorial (in honor of his wife Mary Lou) which has helped us to provide things that wouldn't have been done without this financial help. One of the major expenditures In 2023 was a special workshop for our Family Caregivers. We have received many cards, calls and notes from our seniors, telling us how much they appreciate the *CONNECTIONs* provided by this group and how close they feel to our church.

Thanks to Tina Johnson for making this a reality! Warren Wright, along with others, routinely start the coffee on Sunday mornings. Very simple instructions encourage anyone to "start the brew." Also, we have seen donations of sweets which add to the welcoming atmosphere. Any donations are welcome!

Archivist: Deb Shock wasted no time continuing to preserve Olivet's legacy by reviewing and categorizing Olivet's history in documents, photos and records of important events.

Mutual Ministry Team: The team's mission is to meet with the pastors quarterly for personal support, to provide a forum for brainstorming, conflict resolution guidance, and prayer.

Olivet Leisure League: This has been one of the best times of the 46 years this group has been in existence at Olivet. Our senior membership has topped over 55 (with a number of seniors over 90 still actively involved.) Beyond our monthly day trips and activities, members willingly donate items and assist at our annual September Harvest Sale (between worship services.) With the proceeds and the help of Thrivent's donation, we purchased men's and women's personal care items. In record time, the Leisure League members assembled 125 men's Christmas gift bags and 16 deluxe bags for the women living at Sparrows Nest, all clients of Toledo's Cherry Street Mission.

Our enjoyment also centers around monthly bus trips to unique destinations and other fun activities. All members are so cooperative and helpful that we have never had difficulties. Fortunately, this past year we did not lose any current members. However, we will always remember past members - John Schuster, Lois Brinning, Alice Schuster and Lucille Gee who joined many of our other former members in heaven this year. Truly, it is only with God's help that we are able to continue this ministry to keep our seniors active, involved and helping those less fortunate with our gifts to Cherry Street Mission.

COMMUNITY MISSION EMPHASIS

Pr. Melissa Micham, Convener Address social issues by focused engagement in community partnerships.

In 2023, subgroups of the Community Mission Emphasis Team continued established ministries and emerged to focus on these new goals:

- 1. Surround **15-20-year-olds** in the Sylvania community with practical and spiritual support to nurture well-being and provide safety.
- 2. Enhance our partnership with **Urban Wholistics** to foster meaningful youth engagement, racial equity, and food security.
- 3. Address gun violence through advocacy in our communities, across Ohio, and at the federal level.

Our **15-20-year-old** team joined forces with members of the community team addressing gun violence from a mental health perspective and two of our congregational teams in a period of discernment. Having identified LGBTQIA+ youth at particular risk of both self-harm and other's violence, we initiated a drop-in opportunity for LGBTQIA+ youth and allies once a month. See more in the congregational report.

Olivet's partnership with **Urban Wholistics Farms** continued this year. Olivet presented a \$1,000 contribution to the organization at the *Taste and See: Urban Farming* congregational event Sunday, April 30, 2023. Pastor Lee Ann Pomrenke was our guest preacher in worship; the Equity and Community Mission Emphasis Teams supplied a delicious, locally-sourced brunch; and we learned about urban farming from Urban Wholistics and State Senator Paula Hicks-Hudson. Olivet participated in monthly gardening days at Tatum Park this summer.

In addition to projects mentioned in the congregational report, the **Equity Team** (formerly the Racial Equity Team) contributed \$500 and human resources in the preparation and execution of a Rev. Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr. celebratory worship service and call to action hosted by Glenwood Lutheran Church.

Addressing **gun violence** is a key concern of our faith community. A team of interested members assembled in the spring. The fruit of their labors was a **Gun Violence Prevention Forum**, offered Sunday, July 30, 2023. Over 80 participants from more than a dozen faith communities joined to learn about Moms Demand Action, Sisters 4 Unity, and other local efforts to reduce gun violence. Additional forums were held at Trinity Episcopal Church on Sunday, October 8, and Braden United Methodist Church on Sunday, November 19, 2023.

Amy Dixon secured a \$1,060 grant from Thrivent Choice Dollars (designated to Olivet by Thrivent Financial members) for the purchase of **five new car seats** for the Salem Lutheran Church community. This ensures access to basic resources for families dependent on ridesharing for transportation. Another \$250 Thrivent Action Grant was used to supply **1400 diapers** in the same community.

The Food (In)Security Team's main project was a yearlong ingathering of toiler paper for the Redeemer Lutheran Church Food Pantry. Congregational donations of over 3000 rolls were delivered in 2023.

The team also collected congregational contributions for **Easter baskets** distributed by Sylvania Area Family Services (SAFS), supplemented by a \$250 Thrivent Action Grant; received congregational donations of **backpacks** and secured a \$750 Thrivent Choice Dollars grant for **school supplies** for SAFS; purchased school supplies for Redeemer Lutheran Church and Lutheran World Relief with a \$250 Thrivent Action Grant; and contributed \$300 through Meijer Simply Give for a **\$900 benefit** for the SAFS Food Pantry. Clearly, Thrivent has been a meaningful financial partner this year!

Pastor Melissa attended quarterly meetings of the Neighborhood Bridges—Sylvania board. This organization resources physical needs in our community, especially for households with school-aged children. Olivet was a

"Kindness Council Member" in 2023, denoting our \$500 contribution in 2022. Stough & Stough Architects made a \$500 contribution in 2023 to continue support despite our reduced community mission budget in 2023.

Olivet Cares continues to provide information about community resources for mental health, addiction, youth and aging: https://olivetcares.weebly.com.

Olivet provided space for the non-profit **Once Is Enough** to host its annual Christmas celebration and giveaway. The organization supports families fleeing domestic violence.

Olivet's quarterly benevolence supported our partnerships with the following ministries: Redeemer Lutheran Church, Lutheran Social Services (LSS), Genacross Lutheran Services, Luther Home of Mercy, Lutheran Intersynodical Deaf Ministries, and Sylvania Area Family Services (SAFS).

Ministries in Support of Our Community

The Prayer Shawl Ministry Team was started by two avid knitters, Charlotte Shaffer, and Joyce Barger, in the Spring of 2005. Joyce is still very much involved in this important ministry today. Over the years, by knitting or crocheting, we have freely given approximately 1,381 Prayer Shawls. Our shawls are meant to be tangible evidence of our prayers for God's peace and comfort to the recipients. They are freely given to ANYONE in need of comfort or support during an illness or the loss of a loved one. Our shawls are available by contacting the church office. We meet once a month and provide the yarn needed to knit or crochet a shawl along with patterns and guidelines to follow. As we close these meetings, we pray over each shawl turned in. We depend on cash donations to keep this ministry going, and we need knitters and crocheters who would like to create these beautiful shawls. There are no deadlines or nothing to purchase, just using your hands and talent for God's work. We had a few of our members donate over 160 hats to Cherry Street Mission and 27 Red White and Blue Lap-blankets to Flag City Honor Flight in Findlay.

Giving Trees: What a generous response for the families of Sylvania Area Family Services and children of Redeemer Lutheran Church. Several thousand dollars in gift cards came from church members and Olivet Christian Nursery School families. The donations were also enhanced with \$2,000, thanks to our Thrivent Choice Fund. PLUS, many beautifully wrapped presents for Redeemer's children. With the gift cards we helped seven families/30 individuals from Sylvania Family Services, 10 children from Redeemer Afterschool Program and several Olivet members. This is the first year that we included food gift cards as a family gift along with these children's wrapped gifts.

Daily Bread, Olivet's Wednesday Free Community Meal: As we celebrate 14 years of Daily Bread, we are settling into the post pandemic world. After much discussion it was decided that we will continue with the weekly "drive through" meals format. We miss the interaction with those we serve, but we are still able to provide a hot meal. Also, our volunteers are available for prayer and to take prayer requests, which are forwarded to our prayer team. Over the 47 weeks of 2023, we served 4,804 meals, including a record 309 for our Thanksgiving meal.

We continue to respect our environment as much as possible, despite the use of Styrofoam trays for the dinners. We recycle as much as possible, collect compostable waste, and donate unused food to the weekly food distribution whenever possible.

We are blessed and ever thankful for the many faithful volunteers who give so much of their time, talents, and treasures to keep this important ministry running smoothly. Without the generosity and support of our Olivet family, we would not be able to continue to serve the community. We give a special thanks to those who donate the take-home trays we use weekly, and to Main Street Sweets, who graciously donate their unsold pastries to give to our guests.

As we look forward to 2024, we invite you to participate in this valuable ministry in any way that you are able and ask that you please keep us and those we serve in your prayers.

Food Ministries

Weekly Wednesday Food Distribution: Each week, seven men and women stand out in the heat, rain and freezing weather giving food to the most appreciative people. We gave food to 4044 families, feeding 10,060 individuals, giving them the equivalent of 90,540 meals. This year because our needs increased so much we changed our traffic patterns, so not to interfere with afternoon pre-school. New traffic directors were added. Thank you to the seven people who so willingly volunteered to help out with this duty. The Northwest Ohio Food Bank has not always been able to provide produce each week, so we purchase lettuce, carrots, onions and sometimes apples, oranges or cuties. Kroger donates bread and pastries. A local bakery delivery man donates his day-old goods. We also have angels who donate eggs and butter, and a local farmer who donates potatoes when he has extra to share. We truly do believe in the fishes and loaves miracle. We share any leftovers with the following: Cherry Street Mission, Glenwood Lutheran Church, St. Paul's Community Center and Redeemer Lutheran Church. We thank you for your monetary donations which helps feed this ministry.

Olivet's Food Pantry is kept stocked by both the congregation and the Northwest Ohio food Bank. Ten men offer to drive to the food bank, load up their vehicles and deliver food back to church. I would like to thank the 18 individuals who, after stocking the shelves, pack up about 60 bags of groceries that are given out each week. Thank you to the office staff and volunteers who so graciously greet and serve our guests. We served 2,788 families this last year; that is 6,931 individual people with enough food for 83,160 meals. The Northwest Ohio Food Bank charges 18 cents per pound of food. We are also able to purchase meat for Daily Bread from them at 20 cents per pound.

Olivet Christian Nursery School: Founded in 1967, OCNS offers an enriched curriculum which follows the Ohio Early Content Standards and prepares children for kindergarten in a play-based, parent cooperative setting. OCNS is open to all children ages 3-5 who are potty-trained. Morning and afternoon sessions are offered 9:00-11:30 a.m. (M-F); 12:15-2:45 (M,W,Th); Lunch Bunch option is available for an additional fee, 11:30-12:30 p.m. (M,W,Th). Current enrollment for the 2023-2024 school year is 126 students with eight employees. Registration for the 2024-2025 school year is now open. GLOBAL MISSION EMPHASIS

Make direct connections for learning, mutual support and relief with people around the world.

In December of 2022, we established the following new goals for the coming three years:

- 1. Support existing ministries with more frequent direct communication with global partners, including ELCA's Good Gifts program.
- 2. Strengthen relationships with Lutheran Immigration and Refugee Service, Lutheran World Relief, and locally based refugee and asylum seeker efforts through US TOGETHER.
- 3. Promote learning, action, and advocacy related to global climate change.

2023 was an exceptionally exciting year for our team, including trips to our mission partners in Mexico and Tanzania by members of our Synod and welcoming a family fleeing the war in Ukraine to our community.

In February, we learned of a local nonprofit group called Toledo Helps Ukraine, founded and led by Alona Matchenko, whose goal is to find sponsors and support for families fleeing the war in Ukraine. An Olivet member generously agreed to be a sponsor; a family in need was identified, and we began to make plans for receiving them. We were tasked with providing three months of temporary housing, and the committee accepted Hunter Morrison's offer to house the family in her finished basement for that period. We began collecting furniture and household items for their living space.

On July 19, a few members of our team drove to the Detroit airport to welcome Viktor, Maria, Ivan, and Tymo Vozniuk to America! By this writing, thanks to the efforts and fortunate connections of our team members, the Vozniuks are well settled in their new country, with a new home, employment, medical and dental care, two vehicles, and even a French Bulldog puppy!

For twelve days in May, Bishop Daniel Beaudoin led a delegation of NW Ohio Synod members to Tanzania to attend the May 7 consecration of Bishop Christian Ndossa of the ELCT Dodoma Diocese. The ELCT is the second largest Lutheran church in the world, with over eight million members. Olivet has a partnering relationship with the Lwihomelo congregation of the Dodoma Diocese, led by Pastor Emma Kinyunyu. While there, a group of our women participated in a retreat to build relationships with female Tanzanian leaders. Our congregation sent sunglasses, pencils, T-shirts made by our VBS students and a framed photo of our whole membership waving hello. Pastor Emma gifted us with candles to be used in our worship services. Shared projects there include Aya School, the Mzogole water well, Dodoma Lutheran College, and the Hekima Vocational School.

In September, eight people from Olivet and the NWO Synod participated in a Friendship Trip to Mexico. Attending from Olivet were Pastor Nate, Steve and Cathy Sanderson, Susan Santoro and Roxie Dodge. We explored Mexico City and experienced the hospitality of our partners in ministry in the Mexican Lutheran Church (ILM). We learned about the Lutheran Seminary, visited the Missionary we sponsor, Pastor/Professor David Brondos and met several leaders of the ILM. We visited Casa Tochan, a shelter for migrants that assists people with very basic needs for their lives and journey to legally enter the United States. The Casa is a partner ministry with the ELCA program called AMPARO. We have established relationships which will enrich the experiences of those who take further trips. We also gifted the seminary with financial support.

In October, quilts and school kits were once again boxed up and sent to Lutheran World Relief to comfort and support children and adults around the world. Sincere thanks to the dedicated leaders of these annual efforts in Global Ministry.

In November, we welcomed Presidente Roberto Trejo, Bishop of the Lutheran Church in Mexico. He and Bishop Beaudoin joined Olivet members for dinner and an evening of worship and discussion on November 8. We gifted Presidente Trejo with a quilt and a prayer shawl.

Mary Glover and Pat Sheets have been faithful on Wednesdays serving guests coming for food. Penny Moran who is our keen-eyed proofer and greeter on Thursdays. Mary deserves a "second nod of thanks" as she partners on Friday in readying bulletins and signage, ensuring that all is ready for Sunday.

Look who joined the office volunteers this year - Janet Kish. We are so lucky she shares her Tuesdays with us, and do we ever keep her busy. That is her request: "Give me things to do." All our front desk volunteers are so kind and friendly when greeting guests (over 3,000 per year) who come for food, or tending to the needs of callers and visitors.

Throughout this booklet are examples of the numerous volunteers who serve Olivet's many ministries. Many members have answered an occasional plea to assist with projects such as VBS. Thank you one and all!

Want to experience some of the JOY that is felt in serving in the office? We can always use subs to fill in when others need a day off. Give Shannon a call. We accept volunteers on their terms.

Building Security: A new category this year involves all doors being locked while school is in session and during office hours. Much thought and conversation went into making this decision. Staff, volunteers and teachers agree unanimously that it works well. Currently, visitors to the church must ring the doorbell for entrance to the church. We expect a quote soon on a system that will give us more capabilities to interact visually and verbally FROM WITHIN THE OFFICE to anyone wishing to enter the building, including a remote control that will allow staff to open the door.

Thrivent Choice Fund: Thank you to those who have Thrivent Financial investment products and directed their Thrivent Choice Dollars to Olivet. Through your generosity, we were able to reach out in ways we could not through our regular giving. By directing Choice Dollars to Olivet in 2023, we provided support for Olivet's Giving Tree program, Leisure League's Cherry Street Ministries project, Sylvania Family Services, Once is Enough Program/domestic abuse recovery, Car seats for Salem = \$4627 total. Thrivent members' generosity, by directing Choice Dollars, generated \$6259. that accumulated in Olivet's Thrivent Choice Dedicated Fund. Current balance: \$6248. The request form is available in the church office. Requests fall into one of four categories: 1. Community Outreach; 2. Seminarian Support; 3. Youth; 4. Mission Trips.

<u>Thrivent Members!</u> If you have not directed your Thrivent Choice Dollars for the current year, you have until March 31, 2024. If they are not directed by March 31, 2024, they will be lost. We hope to see more involvement if possible.

- Landscape Team: This team of members continues their devotion to all the varied perennial gardens that surround Olivet. The creativity in each garden is awesome and thanks are due to those who donate their time and occasionally their dollars. Thanks to Cathy & Steve Sanderson, Ed Rupley, Tina Johnson, Deb Shock, and Barb Cousino. Beauty surrounds us due to your TLC of our property.
- The Memorial and Honoraria Committee's ministry is to provide a way for family and friends to memorialize or honor their loved ones. Thoughtfully applied to the mission and ministry at Olivet Lutheran Evangelical Lutheran Church, these gifts are an expression of faith. Honoraria gifts are given to recognize family and friends for special events and/or significant events in that person's life. Olivet's bi-monthly publication, The Olive Press, itemizes all monies received and in whose memory. We invite you to read these as they are publicized.

An updated Memorial & Honoraria brochure is available at church entrances and the Welcome Center to provide information to assist people considering a monetary gift. Committee members: Dave Simko, Charlie Wilson, Shelley McMacken, Barb Bro.

Of special note this year - A donation was "walked in" by Margaret Hentges (widow of David Hentges), the surviving daughter-in-law of Alverna Hentges. This \$9,000 donation was a surprise gift, as Alverna (and Denise's) residence was sold recently. Margaret knew of the life-long dedication that both Denise and Alverna had for their beloved Olivet and wanted to gift this to us. Approved by Council, the gift was designated as follows: \$7500 to Endowment Fund, \$500 to Altar Guild, \$500 To Olivet Choir, \$500 to Food Pantry.

Year end balance: \$45,903. See Dedicated Fund in Financials. This also includes \$917 categorized as Landscaping, which is remainder of the Ruff family donation of trees several years ago. Plaques on order.

- **Personnel Team:** Responsible for developing policies and procedures that assist the staff in understanding the expectations for a position at Olivet Evangelical Lutheran Church. The team, with approval of the Congregation Council, implements these procedures and policies with adherence to Olivet's mission and ministry as our central focus. Olivet has received a resignation from Patty Stammler, our Communications Specialist, who will be with us through January 2024.

- Endowment Fund: During calendar year 2023, the Greater Toledo Community Fund (GTCF) continued its management of the assets of Olivet's Endowment Trust fund. After a disappointing three (3) quarters of market investment returns, the market rallied in the 4th quarter, along with additional gifts from generous Olivet members and friends in the amount of *\$8,785.00, producing an ending balance of \$41,170.62.

 *Note special gift in Memorial Fund Report—Page 17. Our goal, as printed in the Endowment Trust document, is to reach \$100,000 and then make annual distributions of the earned interest from the Fund to those qualifying groups/projects as approved by Council and the congregation. If you wish to obtain information concerning the Endowment Trust Fund, please feel free to contact any of the elected Trustees or the church office staff. Brochures describing The Endowment Trust Fund are available in Olivet's information area at the Welcome Center.
- **Finance Team:** Comprised of a group of extremely gifted business professionals with expertise in the field of finance, banking, and management, this team is dedicated to the stewardship of finances of Olivet and meets monthly. The team works with staff to initiate and work out the details to administer the annual budget, as approved by Council and Congregation. Shannon details weekly income vs. goal in Olivet's weekly Constant Contact email which is sent to 350 households. Justin Black (team leader), Barry Shaner (treasurer), Shannon Walker (staff), Mike Vince (staff/financial secretary), Kevin Kornowa, John Gonia and Bob Mens. These gentlemen have given 15 years serving. All are volunteers except Mike & Shannon.
- **Tellers** meet every Monday to count the weekly offering. Shannon prepares the deposit for the bank courier to pick up. Thanks to our faithful members: Jerry Dunaway, Greg Fett, John Husman, Nancy Kelley and Marlene Schober. We sadly lost Bea French, who suddenly passed last summer.
- Olivet's William & Martha Cox Garden of Peace was dedicated on Sunday, November 11, 2007. It continues to provide a safe and serene final resting place for the cremains of Olivet members and their immediate families plus former members, staff, and their immediate families. Brass plaques in the Garden memorialize those interred there, and additional plaques remember loved ones interred elsewhere. A total of forty-

three interments have occurred since 2007, including three in 2023.

Twenty additional Olivet family members have now pre-planned their interment here. Arranging interment is a simple procedure for those considering this beautiful life memorial. Brochures with full details are available near the church office entrance or may be requested directly from the office.

The garden provides a beautifully landscaped, peaceful, private, and quiet place for remembrance, prayer, and meditation. 2023 saw revised landscaping work done throughout the garden, including stone added to the front area that approaches the Sanctuary doors. The curved mural wall had its capstone recaulked this year, and professional repair was completed on the inner garden facing mural, which had several tiles come loose this past winter.

2023 Trustees: John Holshoe (chairperson), Karen Keefer (secretary), Helene Lyon (financial secretary), Ann Hansen, Mike Linehan and Donna Mens. Sandy Husman continues to assist as an ex-officio member and design chairperson. Pastor Nathan Tuff serves as spiritual advisor and Ed Rupley remains the Garden archivist.

Property Team: We continue to make progress on sprucing up our spaces. This year we repaired/replaced the exterior doors and painted the outsides and insides of all of the exterior doors (16 of them!). The doors exiting the sanctuary going to the sacristy and hallway on the East side were painted along with the woodwork. The interior wall just to the side of the office door was repaired and painted in preparation for new signage. We also refreshed the small garden by the mailbox (the door exiting towards the laundromat), removing old bushes, planting two new bushes and grass. Weed control is an ongoing project with some dedicated people tackling the tough weeds on an ongoing basis. One of our newer members volunteered to paint the church bell, which sits in the courtyard just outside the office entrance. The brightened bell enhances the courtyard, which contains red roses and burning bushes. Shrubs have been trimmed, which is done for both aesthetic reasons and security reasons. Many hands have helped with these projects. This spring, we will target another garden or two for refreshing as well as continue to spruce up areas with paint.

We can always use additional help. If you have a few hours to spare, we have a job for you. Contact Tina Johnson, Bob Mens, Mike Cook, or Shannon Walker.

Accomplished Projects - 2023 At a Glance

Phones, Communication and Computers:

- The 2022 expanded computer network system set us up to move forward with a new Wi-fi based phone system. After searching for different providers, we have chosen to work with Comm-Core, a Maumee based company. Having worked with their phone systems in the past, Tyler knew that they are very simple and make the migration process very easy. At the time of this writing, all migration documentation has been signed, phones have been installed, and we are only pending the cutover to the new phone system. The cost of this was only \$1600 and a budgeted expense for 2023.
- New fiber cable has been purchased and needs to be run through the church for future bandwidth needs.
- Habitec security system expanded to cell service earlier this year-providing much more efficient coverage.
- Tyler's propensity to save money but get better coverage also led to signing up for Buckeye Broadbands's offer for their new fiber optic service. Coverage for 12 months at only \$30 per month vs. \$140.
- We love the addition of the three TVs at our entrances running digital messages promoting and informing of our ministries and events. The first system, Xibo, served us well for about six months (at no cost) and then became very problematic. After much research, a system called Yodeck was purchased as a cloud-based solution. This new system was extremely simple to set up and will not need the same level of management that Xibo did. The three TVs were converted to the new system in late 2023. The cost of Yodeck is under \$200 per year. Let's just say: this is a case where you get what you pay for! We thank staff member, Patty Stammler, for the beautiful messages she creates weekly to showcase Olivet's ministries to all.
- The computers at Olivet received a major upgrade this year. All computers were upgraded from a standard hard drive (HDD) to a solid state drive (SSD). These SSDs make the computers significantly faster for

both day-to-day activities and also during the startup process. The SSDs were donated to Olivet.

 A slightly used laptop was donated and set up using enterprise grade features given to Olivet for free from Microsoft. This includes a free backup option for the data on the computer and free enterprise grade antivirus. This newer laptop replaces an old computer and is essential to our Wednesday food programs.

Lighting:

• There are only a few storage rooms that still need LED lighting. Tyler continues to research appropriate replacement LED's for the Christian Life Center.

Atrium lighting conversion remains a bit expensive and not worth replacing at this time. Lights in the Atrium are rarely used because skylights bring in plenty of light during the day.

A must to acknowledge, even though it was a 2022 accomplishment, are the GENIUS sanctuary lighting controls! VERY SIMPLE BUTTONS work the lights located conveniently in three places: 1. near the original location on the wood cabinet; 2. in the choir loft, and; 3. in the stairway leading from the office. It's exciting every time they are used. Thanks again, Tyler & Michael.

Christian Life Center Worship/Music:

- A new digital drum kit was acquired thanks to an anonymous donor. \$1500.
- The Power Point sharing system was changed to Next Cloud
- Speaker mounts and cables for power were planned and purchased (\$1600) to allow the speakers to be suspended above the stage. They will be installed when they arrive.

Other projects:

- Roofing repairs on our roof (it's 17 years old).
- One of our very tall and unhealthy Cottonwood trees on the west side began to feel threatened by high winds. Upon quickly getting an estimate, it was determined that it was already split at its base and considered an emergency. The tree was taken down the next day, especially given its location on Olivet's border so close to the neighboring car dealership. Cost: \$5,000.
- In December, 2022 the attic pipes burst. The church's insurance covered most of the repairs/labor. Ceilings were replaced from east to west ends of the main hallway, including one office ceiling tile; pipes and attic insulation were replaced. Also covered was the destroyed/water logged Fire Panel located in the nearby janitor closet. Although restoration of the building items first listed took about three months due to work time being limited by OCNS school day schedule, the Fire Panel replacement was delayed by the Lucas County regulators/Fire Inspectors and finally approved in early November. The Fire Panel was completed and inspected FINALLY in early December. The invoice for \$15,080 was paid on Dec. 22. The final insurance check is due soon for the amount held back pending proof that completion/invoice was paid.
- New folder equipment for office: Our 18 year-old folder required service this fall. A partial repair helped but its complete demise was in November. We managed to hand-fold all December bulletins and newsletters while we researched a replacement. This wonderful tool folds all sizes of paper at lightning speed as did our former machine, so it was a must to replace. We received our new one Jan. 15 at a cost of \$1,700, well spent. Thanks for your research and ordering of it, Chrisann. Happy Day for Mary and all of us.

Planned and Budgeted for 2024:

New restroom floors for the main school hallway restrooms. BADLY NEEDED! Approximately \$3,000.

Wish List for the Future: (not budgeted)

- Computer upgrades will be necessary before October, 2025. \$300 for each of seven computers.
- Piano for the CLC: \$5,000. Keys experiencing trouble on 2017 current piano.
- New beltpack microphones for the Sanctuary \$2300. An additional wireless handheld mic would be handy for some events. Current mics are all functioning.
- Speakers for the CLC: Step 1 accomplished with speaker mounts purchased. Step 2 new speakers, \$3,000. Matching subs for speakers \$2,000.
- Permanently mounted projector in the Sanctuary \$2,000-\$4,000.
- A TEAMS meeting room completely set up/interactive room for meetings—\$4,000. Without using individual devices.
- New roof for entire building. Estimated use left: 5-7 years. CLC roof installed 2006. Original East-West roof was replaced in 2007.
- New parking lot pavement: Several areas have been <u>only resurfaced</u>. The entire lot will need replacement. Estimated \$100,000.
- Olivet's organ This fully electronic organ was installed in 1984 and is starting to show its age. A meeting was held with an Allen Organ representative and the local dealer representative from Craig's Pianos. From this meeting, it was determined that a brand new console and speakers for the sanctuary would cost around \$200,000 to \$250,000. The organ is still supported by service and parts if needed.

It bears repeating year to year that we owe Tyler Martin a debt of gratitude for all of his collaboration to tackle so many tasks. His propensity to research, analyze and make recommendations are integral to our operations at Olivet. His very detailed report is available in the church office and is submitted to Council. Excerpts of it are contained within my report on pages 19-20.

Thanks to the many folks mentioned and not mentioned in the pages of this Annual Report. You all make Olivet what we are - a caring, wonderful group of souls praising God through our daily work together.

I love sharing the joys and the challenges for these 20 years of my rewarding ministry among YOU ALL!
