

The narrative lectionary is relatively new, developed at Luther Seminary by professors Rolf Jacobson and Craig Koester to cover the full arc of the biblical journey in one school year.

Olivet has used this lectionary before, but it's been a while. We revive it this year as an additional support for our Body Shop (confirmation) youth who will be studying both the Old and the New Testaments.

AROUND OLIVET

OLIVET'S FOOD MINISTRIES

Stop by the Christian Life Center on nearly any Wednesday and you will find a beehive of activity as Olivet's Food Ministry teams prepare for a busy day. It all starts in the morning, when the truck from the Northwestern Ohio Food Bank makes its weekly delivery of produce and baked goods. A team of volunteers goes to work, sorting the food by type and quantity. When the sorting is complete, individual boxes are filled, ready for the drive through distribution that begins at 1 PM. Meanwhile, the shopping and preparations for the evening Daily Bread meal are underway at local grocery stores and in the kitchen.

And this is only what you see. A behind the scenes look may give you a better understanding of Olivet's food ministries.

One of the most asked questions is "Where do you get the food?" Our congregation has always been generous in their donations of food. In addition, on Tuesdays, a gentleman brings breads that are slightly outdated and have been pulled from grocery store shelves. Every Wednesday, a truck from the Northwestern Ohio Food Bank delivers four or more pallets, stacked with boxes of assorted produce and baked goods. Often, the delivery includes a Gaylord (very large box), filled with anything from breads to beverages.

On Monday and Wednesday, during church office hours, the Olivet Food Pantry has bags of dry groceries available. Each household can pick up one bag, every two weeks. Twice a month, the pantry can purchase up to 2,700 pounds of food, which is then sorted, shelved, and put into the bags, ready for pick up. As needed, meat for the Daily Bread meal is also purchased as part of the monthly allotment.

On the average week, 75 bags of groceries are distributed, 115 families receive the boxes of produce, and between 100 and 150 meals are served at the Daily Bread drive through.

How does all this happen? Simply put...it's the crew of wonderful volunteers who give of their time. Olivet's food ministries wouldn't be the success they are without the 45-50 people it takes to keep the program running smoothly.

Thank you, all, for the support you have given us through the years!

They also communicated that they were very proud of Ivan for making Honor Roll at Sylvania's McCord Junior High for the school year. They also mentioned that Tymofii would be having surgery on his leg to help him (hopefully) walk easier. The surgery was on



July 23 and went well. Tymofi is in a leg cast for 6 weeks and wasn't initially too happy about that but quickly acclimated.

PROJECT PIKI PIKI FUNDS RAISED

Thanks to the generosity of our Vacation Bible School families and members of Olivet, we were able to donate \$4,961 towards purchasing piki pikis (motorbikes) for the evangelists in the Dodoma Diocese of Tanzania. This buys 3 bikes!! This amount will be matched by the Northwestern Ohio Synod. Thank you for making the work of these evangelists easier as they spread the Good News of Jesus to the people of Tanzania.

YOUTH DAY AT CEDAR POINT JULY 28



Get to Know Mary Glover

Carol and Al celebrated their 30th wedding anniversary at Olander Park shortly after Carol was diagnosed with a terminal brain tumor. During the anniversary celebration, then-pastor of Olivet, Pastor Cox, snuck in a surprise: a wedding vow renewal ceremony for every married couple present! "It was the nicest thing you ever saw in your life," Mary recalled fondly. "It was special because it was just a little bit before my mom passed away."

Olivet has been Mary's church home for nearly all her life, "including the nine months I came with Mom before I was born," Mary added. Carol and Mary were both confirmed at Olivet (although Mary delayed her confirmation a year when the pastor at the time falsely accused her of smoking in the

Mary's family was very involved at Olivet. She and her mother would pull Mary's two younger siblings in a wagon from their home on Centennial Road to Olivet and back each Sunday. Among her many other roles at church, Carol served as a Sunday School teacher along with Mary's aunt. When asked what her first volunteer role was at church, Mary honestly answered, "They weren't voluntary." She remembered being volun-TOLD what to do often and was determined to never be like her very-involved mother. However, at age 16, Mary's involvement at Olivet became a personal choice—and passion.

Mary has always had a deep love for helping people. When she was 16, she

began working at a nursing home, and started volunteering (by choice!) at a free clothing store Olivet ran at the time. She's assisted with the rummage sale by helping break down boxes and sorting donated jewelry. She's helped with Olivet's food pantry, preparing bags and assisting food pantry guests. She currently serves twice weekly as a volunteer in the church's main office. Mary's

also helped provide childcare for many of Olivet's kids over the years, an area of ministry she discovered she was suited for thanks in part to, of all things, her asthma. When sorting dust-laden rummage sale donations began triggering asthma attacks. Mary was tasked with watching the other volunteers' children—something she, and others, realized she was a natural at.

Mary has faced numerous health challenges in her life, yet continues serving at Olivet as she is able. One condition she developed was heart disease as the result of a high fever while sick with strep throat around age 8. Mary was so determined to perform her solo in the choir on Christmas Eve, she refused to tell anyone how unwell she was really was. After the service, her father realized she was burning up and got her the treatment she needed. Needless to say, she never performed with strep again!

From the many physical challenges she's endured, Mary's developed a deep sense of compassion for others. "You've never been in that person's shoes," Mary has

told those who've previously passed judgment. "Don't judge them." Mary's passion for helping others is clear in the way she lights up with joy remembering special people and

memories. Woven throughout our conversation were numerous stories she's collected of those she's met, served, and loved. She summarized her heart for others so beautifully: "I care for everybody that I know. Even people I don't know. I know that God's with us always: I've never doubted that. This is the love that I have for God, and when my love is there, it's there for everybody that I know. And sometimes when people come [for food assistance at Olivet], it's even for them when I don't know who they are, and they're telling me their saddest points. And I listen."

Mary credits Olivet for helping instill this posture of compassion and service in her. The faith she finds at the heart of Olivet resonates with her own faith, making Olivet feel more like home than home. "I go home every time I come here," Mary shared. "Sometimes I don't want to leave here."

COMMON THREAD QUILTERS & SCHOOL KITS

(LUTHERAN WORLD RELIEF)

This year, Lutheran World Relief is celebrating 80 years of doing ministry in communities who are experiencing poverty, war, and natural disaster. This organization was formed in 1945 to help Lutherans who were impacted by World War

II in Europe. Today, Lutheran World Relief operates in East and West Africa, Latin America, Asia, and the Middle East. Their work focuses on sustainable development projects and disaster relief and recovery.

Olivet contributes to the work of Lutheran World Relief in two primary ways: making quilts and assembling school kits. Mission quilts make life brighter, softer, and a bit more comfortable for our neighbors around the world

struggling with chronic poverty, illness, natural disaster, and conflict. Sine its founding, Lutheran World Relief has distributed over 28 million quilts. Olivet's quilting group, Common Thread Quilters, creates and sends quilts every year around the world through Lutheran World Relief.

Common Thread Quilters, led by Olivet member Carol Leupp, began in 2016 with six members. They have grown in number to 12 members, plus many volunteers who donate sheets and help tie quilts on a Saturday in March or April. In 2024, the quilters completed 220 quilts to send to Lutheran

World Relief and to give out locally to Redeemer and Salem Lutheran Churches and Wolf Creek residents. Quilters are always welcome to join the group on Tuesday mornings as they assemble the layers needed for each quilt.

In addition to supplying lovinglycreated guilts. Olivet also assembles school kits for Lutheran World Relief each back-to-school season. These school kits contain essential supplies to help children—and in some cases, adults-continue learning in the face of serious obstacles. Olivet's Global Mission Team is so thankful for members of Olivet who have generously contributed to our goal of completing 100 school kits. We are also grateful to our Body Shop students and teachers who assemble and pack the kits. Thank you for making education possible for children around the world!

In Part 2, we explored Olivet as it expanded and became a staple in the community. In Part 3, we will explore some of the trials that Olivet faced.



In 1957, Olivet had expanded to include an office and education wing, as well as a chapel (shown left). On February 13, 1959, tragedy struck when a fire damaged the basement and front area of the nave. If it wasn't for Sylvania Officer L. D. McMahon who saw an orange glow through the door window at 1:45 AM, the entire church would have been lost. This fire occurred where the elevator, stairs to the basement through the Welcome

Center, Usher's Closet, and steps to the choir loft are located today. Services were held at Maplewood School until the \$10,000 worth of damages were repaired.

In July of 1961, Olivet bought a new parsonage for \$20,000 from Mr. and Mrs. Ralph Meeks at 5741 Alexis Road. This property bordered Olivet's 5-acre lot and was a perfect addition to the church. Pastor Joseph Peaslee would be the

first pastor to live in this parsonage. This house stands today and

is now owned by Dave White.

In late 1962 to early 1963, Olivet faced its first major conflict. Pastor Gunther (1961-1962) resigned for "personal reasons" in September 1962 with a 2-month leave of absence. Then, Pastor Peaslee (1958-1963) resigned in December 1962 with a 1-month leave of absence, and took a number of parishioners to start King of Glory Lutheran Church, currently located on Brint between McCord and Main/Holland-Sylvania. The only reason known to this day was found in a letter from Olivet's council secretary to the congregation in January 1963, stating "being a member of The Ohio Synod, it cannot support a mission not approved by the Synod." Like all conflicts, this eventually passed. Pastor Philip Anttila was called in May of 1963 and served as pastor until 1969.

By 1964, it was determined that the 15-year-old sanctuary would not be able to sustain the current growth rate from the Baby Boomer generation. Plans were created to increase the footprint of the sanctuary and education wing, adding 10 classrooms, a new and larger steeple, and new offices. This project came to a cost of \$265,000. Construction started after Easter Sunday in 1965 and was completed and dedicated by Thanksgiving the

same year. Services were held at Sylvania High School (the Burnham Building) during construction. This became the sanctuary as we know it today and included the current choir room, Spark room, and nursery.

On September 24, 1967, Olivet's founding pastor, Dr. Alvin Bell, passed away. During his years of ministry, Dr. Bell

founded Augsburg, Olivet, and Bethany Lutheran Churches. Dr. Bell officiated the baptism of 3,336 children, 846 weddings, and 912 funerals. He is buried in Toledo Memorial Park. On September 24, let's all have a moment of silence to remember that without Dr. Bell, this church and great community of people would not exist.



YEHIEL CURRY ELECTED PRESIDING BISHOP OF THE ELCA

The Rev. Yehiel Curry was elected July 30 to serve a six-year term as presiding bishop of the Evangelical Lutheran Church in America (ELCA). The election took place during the 2025 ELCA Churchwide Assembly held July 28–Aug. 2 at the Phoenix (Ariz.) Convention Center.

Curry was elected on the fifth ballot. There were 799 votes cast, with 400 votes needed for an election. Curry received 562 votes, and the Rev. Kevin Strickland, bishop of the ELCA Southeastern Synod, received 237 votes. Curry is the first Black presiding bishop of the ELCA.

Speaking to the assembly after his election, Curry reflected on his membership at Shekinah Chapel in Riverdale, III., where he eventually became a lay mission developer while he participated in the Theological Education for Emerging Ministries program, which prepares individuals for ordained ministry in the ELCA, with a focus on emerging ministry contexts like ethnic-specific, multicultural, rural and inner-city settings. He spoke to the assembly about his initial hesitation in accepting that first ministry role.

"Perhaps I'm out there in one of you," Curry said. "I never saw myself as good enough, so for two years, I said no. I finally said yes. When I said yes, your support, this church's support, of that ministry meant everything. So if you want to know what your benevolence dollars look like, it looks like me, and I want to say thank you. Thank you for your investment."

Curry has served as bishop of the ELCA Metropolitan Chicago Synod since 2019. He previously served as mission developer (2009-2012) and pastor (2012-2019) of Shekinah.

He received a Bachelor of Arts from Lewis University in Romeoville, Ill., in 1995 and a Master of Divinity from the Lutheran School of Theology at Chicago (LSTC) in 2013. LSTC is one of seven ELCA seminaries.

The churchwide

assembly, the chief legislative authority of the ELCA, met July 28-August 2 under the theme "For the Life of the World." The assembly participated in plenary discussions to make decisions about the work of this church. They also spent time in worship and engaged in various ways of theological reflection.
